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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

A prestigious institution with a century old glorious history of providing quality education and well known as 'Nursery of Vice-Chancellors', Gujranwala Guru Nanak Khalsa College is committed to support, guide and is also the first one to lend a helping hand as and when the students and society requires. Originally established in C.E. 1917, as Guru Nanak Khalsa College, Gujranwala (Pakistan), it had functioned as such till 1947. It has been reconstructed in Ludhiana in C.E 1953 as Gujranwala Guru Nanak Khalsa College. The founder of this institution S. Attar Singh had a great vision due to which the college had flourished. The **alumni** who had made the institution proud are; **Late Professor Mohd. Yusuf Abbasi (alumnus) of first batch of graduates (L937-4L), an eminent historian of Pakistan, served as Pro Vice-Chancellor of prestigious Qaid-i-Azam Jinnah University, Islamabad, Jasbir Singh Bawa passed intermediate in 1938 to enter R.I.M.S. (now N.D.A.) to rise to the position of Lt. Genl. and receive decorations AVSM PVS.M. BL. Kalra graduated and earned appreciation from the Principal as 'our scholar; sportsman, counsel and musician'. He became a leading lawyer of Supreme Court of India. K.S.Narang, a distinguished civil servant made a name in Indian Punjab. His contribution to the establishment of P.A.U., Ludhiana and green revolution is remembered with gratitude.**

The college has established four sister branches; **GGNIVS, GGNIMT, GGNKC of PHARMACY and GGNPS. It is approved under section 2 (f) and 12 (B) of the UGC Act, 1956 and NAAC accredited Grade B with CGPA 2.63 on four point scale along with ISO certification 9001:2015.** The University of Wolverhampton, United Kingdom has signed an MoU with the institution for research and Sikh heritage cultural exchange programmes. It offers various streams of courses at U.G. and P.G. level, along with B.Voc. courses- **Web Technology and Multimedia, E-Commerce and Digital Marketing, Baking and Financial Services, Retail Management, Add-on Courses- Communicative English, Journalism, Bank Management, ISO certified courses- Web Designing, Basic Computing, Hardware Assembly and Maintenance, Desktop Publishing, Accountancy (Tally), Computer and Office Application, Certificate courses under Community College Scheme et all.**

Institutional Strength

STRENGTHS

1. Founded in 1917, the College has always striven for academic excellence and service to the nation. Gujranwala Guru Nanak Khalsa College as an institution ,has faced, and has shaped, the changes in the field of education through colonial times and the freedom struggle, to the era of planned development, the globalized and the digitized times. In the recent years, the College has taken a number of initiatives in the social sector thus serving society at large.
2. Glorious history of more than 100 years; secular, liberal and responsible approach towards students. Reputation of being an iconic institution which has created historical benchmarks in the domain of education and empowerment of all sections of society for the past 103 years.
3. Being one of the oldest mainstream colleges of higher education affiliated to Panjab University, Chandigarh, confers prestige and credibility to our college across the nation and abroad.
4. Committed and visionary management focusing on quality enhancement and sustenance.
5. A good mix of experienced and young faculty. The College has a dedicated and expert faculty with diverse research interests, actively involved in publishing and curriculum development. The faculty believes in strong work ethics and commitment to quality education.
6. There is a strong bond and a high level of interaction between the faculty and the students. The faculty instills a broad foundation of knowledge and skills, equipping individual students to manage their lives in today's complex times.
7. The College is proud of its library collection. It is one of the earliest libraries in the University to have digitized its catalogue and bar code all its books. The College follows the practice of annual weeding out of books, done by the faculty of different departments.
8. The College installed 70 KW solar power plant on its roof thereby leading the way to the harvesting of solar energy.
9. Ideal location, easily approachable by road and railway, beautiful campus
10. The campus with wi-fi facility. Use of ICT in improving College processes and operations.
11. Excellent and well-maintained infrastructure.
12. Quality assurance through IQAC.

Institutional Weakness

1. Increased financial burden on the management due to diminishing grants from the Government.
2. Controlled Procedures to introduce new age programmes at UG and PG level due to affiliation with Panjab University Policies.
3. With a cluster of commercial and residential places located in close proximity to the College, traffic

jams are endemic and are a perpetual problem on the roads leading to the College.

4. Meager research guidance by the faculty and low student involvement in research due to affiliating university policy.
5. Comparatively lesser number of teachers involved in minor/major research projects.
6. Lack of patents.
7. Lack of Institutional Transport system

Institutional Opportunity

1. Exchange of knowledge across borders is in vogue which motivates and also inspires the institution to contribute and to reach out to the plathora of global knowlndge by the extensive use of ICT.
2. The collaborative culture between the academia and student affairs can help us with both strategic planning and decision making to maintain high employee morale. The willingness to recognize weaknesses and make improvements can help us create an atmosphere of success for the faculty, staff and students.
3. Possibility of introducing yet more add-on courses for the benefit of students.
4. More Skill-based courses can be started which will provide an opportunity to faculty to utilize some of their research and expertise for the benefit of students and their prospective employers.
5. Further deployment of technology to make operations smoother and better.

Institutional Challenge

1. It is easier to reach the top but challenging to retain that position as great powers come with great responsibilities.
2. Initiating new courses in the absence of financial support and faculty recruitment policies of the government.
3. Keeping a balance between teaching and research.
4. To keep maintenance costs in check, as the equipment ages, and to maneuver and manage steady source of funds for new procurements and replacements.
5. To find more infrastructural and systemic mechanisms to support for research and knowledge creation, within current operating conditions.
6. The latest trend of abroad studies in the students of the state resulting in decline in student strength.
7. Mushrooming of a number of other educational institutions leading to possibility of decline in student quality.
8. With the number of private universities fast coming up around Ludhiana, the College will have to continuously upgrade its physical infrastructure and also think of innovative ways to retain its highly qualified faculty.
9. Another challenge is to deal with the societal and student perception of education as solely a means to a job.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Gujranwala Guru Nanak Khalsa College, Civili Lines, Ludhiana has been affiliated to Panjab University,

Chandigarh and follows the curricula provided by the same. The college provides a wide range of courses/programmes in Arts, Commerce and Computer Science and Applications at Graduation and Post-Graduation levels. The skill-based courses have been introduced to equip the young minds of male and female students for the upcoming professional challenges. The college has introduced nine academic and other certificate programmes focusing on the employability and skill development of the students during the assessment period; two PG programmes (**M.Sc. Chemistry** and **PGDMC**), four B.Voc. programmes, three new courses and Certificate courses under Community College Scheme in **Hardware and Network Maintenance Technology, Accounting and Taxation, Travel and Tourism Management**. The UG students have to undergo a compulsory exam in **Environment and Road Safety**. The IQAC monitors the curriculum planning infrastructure of the college through a well-documented procedure which involves **strategic plan, university academic calendar, academic calendar of the college, departmental academic plans and structured online feedback programme**. There are various clubs and societies to inculcate value orientation, gender sensitivity, environment consciousness and social responsiveness among the students. The **faculty members represent the college as a member of Senate/Syndicate in teacher's category**. The college conducts **Additional Skill Acquisition Programme (ASAP)** that offers communication skill course to the students. A few academic programmes have practical components such as **internship/field project/field visit**. The teaching fraternity is well-versed with the usage of ICT which makes the teaching and learning process more effective and interesting. The college organises various National and International Seminars, Conferences, Symposiums, Workshops, etc. A good number of faculty members are elected after every three years in the **Board of Studies (U.G. and P.G.) of various faculties of Panjab University, Chandigarh**

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The students admitted to the college belong to the local area and surrounding villages/towns/cities, hence, the teaching pedagogy is chosen according to the requirement of the students. The college encourages inter-disciplinarity, creativity and innovation in its teaching-learning process, with stress on associating theoretical knowledge, and practical training to application for problem solving. **Pedagogical practices include diverse methods such as use of different language and skill labs, internships and presentations, laboratory-based learning for science courses; use of audiovisual and other ICT-based methods. Student-centric education encourages extensive use of dialogue and discussion to facilitate interactive learning. Workshops/Conferences/Symposium are organised to promote peer learning, to provide opportunities to the students to interact with and learn from wider community of visiting scholars.** Remedial measures are adopted to overcome students' weaknesses under guidance of faculty. Various mechanisms and procedures exist to assist all stakeholders to redress examination/ evaluation/compartamental exam-related grievances. The mentoring system is there in the college to assist the students and is well managed. Mentors are responsible to identify students who scored less than 60% marks in their internals. **One faculty is allocated for every 35 students as Mentor for monitoring their mental health, career counseling, attendance, punctuality, discipline and academic performance as well.** The mentoring policy of the IQAC ensures that all full time teachers are engaged in the mentoring activity. Since the students are heterogeneous in terms of their learning levels and socio-cultural background, the college adopts multiple assessment and learning strategies. Academic Calendar of the University is strictly adhered and followed. Evaluation of students is done in a continuous mode during semester through diverse methods that allow students to fortify their strengths. The internal assessment is done based on student's attendance, writing skills (assignment), presentation skills (seminar) and knowledge levels (test papers).

Research, Innovations and Extension

Gujranwala Guru Nanak Khalsa College has given equal importance to research, innovations and extension activities along with teaching and learning. In last five years, **five faculty members have been awarded Ph.D. degree which means that total 19 Ph.D. degree holders** are there in the college. Nearly **150 Seminars and Extension Lectures** were organised during the last five years. The college has NSS and NCC units through which we undertake extension activities in the neighborhood community and help in the holistic development of students and the vicinity. The college has conducted extension and outreach programs in the collaboration with various stakeholders of the society. Participation in *Swachh Bharat Abhiyan*, AIDS Awareness, Blood Donation Camps, Gender Issues etc. has actively been performed by the various units, clubs and societies of the college, like; N.S.S., N.C.C., Rotract Club, etc. The college N.S.S. unit has adopted one village **Thakkarval** for its betterment. The faculty has published **59 research papers in UGC CARE list journals and 156 papers in edited books with ISBN number, book chapters and conference proceedings**. The College promotes research by granting study leave under UGC Faculty Improvement Programme. The students of B.Com, M.Com undertake projects and teachers take special interest in guiding their students. The various extension activities provide the students with a rare consciousness that motivates them to reach out to their fellow beings particularly the needy and the marginalized. To strengthen the support services with regard to placement for students, the Placement Cell is striving hard by offering Job Fair and strengthening Industry Academic interface. The college also provides monetary support to faculty for organizing conferences and workshops. It has an Incubation Centre to encourage entrepreneurship and employment.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The College is spread in four acres of land in an area which has become the epicenter of education. The campus houses many buildings which include well lighted and ventilated classrooms, fully equipped and updated Physics, Chemistry, and Language & Journalism Labs. Computer labs are equipped with latest computers and **Wi-Fi facility of 100mbps band-width. The college purchases computers with genuine OS and has procured 25 licenses of MS Office 2019.** Regular upgradation of Softwares and Hardwares have become a tradition in college. It also houses **Guru Nanak Hall (seating capacity 500), Library, Seminar room and a newly constructed Language and Journalism lab.** The sprawling lawns and vast playgrounds lend magnificence to the physical infrastructure. **The institution has 194 computers, 9 computer Labs and 1 browsing center.** The library provides remote access to e-resources through the platform of **INFLIBNET, DELNET, etc. The library has access to OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue)** where all the library resources are indexed which makes it's easier for the students and the faculty members to browse the books they require. The library functions from 08:00 a.m. to 04:00 p.m. The Budget for infrastructure, library and other learning resources is earmarked annually based on the recommendations of respective committees constituted for upgrading, maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities. The college has fully equipped and advanced 20 laboratories. The Department of Computer Science monitors the overall functioning of ICT resources. There are a sufficient number of UPS's for ensuring power backup. The upkeep of campus and Gardening Committee ensures that the campus remains pollution free and green. To keep it healthy and eco-friendly, burning of dry leaves and polythene bags are prohibited on the campus. A visiting doctor attends to the minor medical needs of the staff /students. **22 CCTV cameras are fixed at all the strategic points on the College campus.** The institution owns a well-planned play ground where the college has facilities of Chess and Table Tennis as indoor games and provision of Cricket, Football, Volley Ball, Basket Ball, Kabaddi (Punjab style and National style) and Athletic as outdoor games.

Student Support and Progression

The college believes that the *institution brand equity* is mainly generated by the quality, progression and success of its students. Therefore, the college takes many proactive steps to help the students in their academic and other endeavours. The College caters to higher education needs of a large number of students, and welcomes diversity in its learning community. A majority of the students belong to General category while others fall under OBC, SC and ST categories. The college provides category wise reserved seats to the students, which are **25% SC/ST, 10% BC, 01% Tsunami, 02% Freedom Fighter, 03% Physically Challenged, 02% Sports, 02% Teacher Ward, 02% Riot Victim and 02% Police Ward**. To enhance the quality of community life, the underprivileged are supported to seek higher education by providing them with fee concessions etc. All eligible students have availed various scholarships under different schemes available in the college. Total number of students received Government and institution/non-government agencies scholarships in last five years is 453 and 630 respectively. A total number of **55 students have qualified UGCNET/GATE/CAT/MAT/JAM, IELTS and other competitive exams and 18 students have won awards for outstanding performance in sports/cultural activities at university/state/national level in last five years**. The total number of students on College rolls in the current session is 1,829 while the admission process is still on in full swing. The Placement Cell supports students in career choices and helps to make job placements in industry, banks, call centers, educational Institutions, etc. The College has a Redressal Cell to look into the grievances and complaints of the students. The Counseling Cell establishes a communication channel between students and Faculty, and helps them to deal with rising stress and to resolve tensions. There are various Clubs and Societies that manage academic and cultural activities of the College. The college gives special focus on coaching for competitive examinations, career counseling, soft skill development, remedial teaching, bridge courses and personal counseling. Students are encouraged to participate in Co-curricular and Extracurricular activities at various levels and are given all opportunities to exhibit their innate talents.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The Managing Committee is the apex body with regard to the matters in policy making. Further, Staff Council and IQAC take care to see that the vision and mission of the college are fulfilled. The college ensures decentralisation and participative management at every realm. The heads of departments are given full freedom in managing their own affairs. The vision and mission of the college correlate with the national policies of higher education and are based on education as a means of development of the nation and social reformation. The college translates its vision and mission through programs and activities such as NCC, NSS, Soft Skills Development Program, Welfare Schemes, Sports, Career Guidance, etc. The college promotes a culture of decentralization and participative management through various academic and administrative committees. The college encourages the faculty to participate in Refresher, Orientation, and Faculty Development Programs to complete their M. Phil. and Ph. D. Study leave and financial support are granted to the faculty for attending seminars, workshops, and conferences. The College has introduced e-governance in administration, finance, accounts, student admissions, examinations and student-teacher management as well. The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff. The performance of the teaching and non-teaching staff is assessed through the Annual Performance Appraisal System. Faculty orientation programmes, seminars, conferences, workshops are organized regularly. The accounts are audited regularly and strictly through the three-tier system. IQAC undertakes quality sustenance and quality enhancement measures. **With the constitution of the Grievance Cell and Sexual Harassment Cell, the grievances and complaints of the students are redressed with required sensitivity**. All major decisions related to academic and administrative affairs are taken by the Principal in consultation with the Managing Committee, IQAC, Steering Committee and the Departmental Heads. **It has developed computerized accounting system, and all financial operations are systematized and transparent.**

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The college maintains the culture of best practices and innovations in its academic and administrative endeavors. Key practices include: Adaptation of advancement in teaching-learning pedagogy and research; advancing knowledge through research, innovation, corporate social responsibilities. Each teacher is provided with an academic diary containing timetable, workload, Annual/Semester teaching plan, actual teaching units, daily teaching plan, and academic and administrative committee responsibilities. The academic diary is monitored by the concerned Head of Departments and the Principal of the college.

The timetable committee prepares a general time-table and HoD of concerned departments prepare departmental timetable. Teachers conduct classes according to the timetable. IQAC and departmental meetings are held periodically to review the syllabus completed.

For the effective transmission and delivery of curricula, departments integrate classroom teaching with various ICT tools, laboratory practical's, field projects, students seminars, tutorials, question papers solving, research projects, field survey, on-the-job training etc.

For the upgradation of subject-related knowledge, college organizes seminars, conferences, and workshops. This activity provides a platform to the faculty and the students to participate and interact with experts in various fields and enrich and update their subject knowledge.

For the effective curriculum delivery teachers use participative, problem solving and student-centric learning methods.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

The prime objective of any educational institute striving to achieve excellence is to identify respective learning levels of the students. The College in conformity to the principles of inclusivity and equity in the admission process facilitates educational opportunities for students from diverse backgrounds, especially those with varying degrees of learning capabilities, particularly from rural and backward areas. Identification of slow learners and advanced learners at the entry level is a necessary step in order to cater the varied needs of students. For newly admitted students, college conducts induction program at the start of academic year. The focus of this induction program is to make students aware with their goals, classroom attendance, examination and evaluation systems and campus facilities. The performance of students is assessed by internal assessment tests and semester end examinations. The process of identification of slow learners comprises conducting discussion, internal tests, viva-voce etc. The performance or obtained grades/marks are the key indicators to categorize students as slow learners and advanced learners in a class. According to university syllabus there are at least two compulsory internal assessment tests conducted at the mid and thirty days prior to the semester end examination. Seminars are conducted in each semester for each student on a pre-assigned topic of the course. Tutorial classes also form the component of curriculum for assessment of students.

Distinction of the students over their performance is easily sought and hence categorization as advanced and slow learners is done. Advanced and slow learners are identified through their performance levels in examinations, interaction in class room and laboratory, their fundamental knowledge, concept understanding and articulation abilities etc. The Institute promotes independent learning atmosphere that contributes to their academic and personal growth.

For slow learners institute provides

- Remedial Teaching and Bridge Courses
- Group Study System /Peer learning system
- Provision of simple and standard lecture notes/course materials
- For students from the non-English education system, English Language Teaching (ELT) is being conducted to help students study and understand basic nuances of the English language
- Motivational classes are conducted to improve the mental ability of students
- Revision of important concepts in a viable manner
- Proper assignments to strengthen learning
- Compensatory classes and tutorials
- Internal Continuous Assessments (ICA) facilitate consistent and proactive tracking of the academic performance of the students.

For Advanced Learners institute provides

- Students are encouraged to join and learn through MOOC Programmes offered by the world's leading institutions.
- Provisions to participate in various inter college competitions
- Research Projects
- Students are given ample opportunities to participate and present papers in National and International Seminars
- Students are encouraged to opt for add on courses along with their curricular
- skill development and communication development programs
- Professional coaching classes

Periodical review meetings were convened to lay down the action plan for upcoming period and follow up of the same was done in the next meeting. The committee stimulated the faculty members to prepare minor/major research projects, research papers, seminars/ conference proposals of their respective field/area of interest from time to time.

The committee also proposed to the put efforts to enhance capabilities to ensure the publication of proceedings of events undertaken at the departmental or individual level. Further, signing up of MOUs and conduct of international conferences/seminars were proposed to strengthen research endeavours in the college. Consequently, there was a substantial increase in the number of research publications as well as in the participation of the faculty in the research oriented activities viz. seminars, conferences etc as compared to the previous years.

3. Career Counselling and Placement Cell:

The college has a well-functioning placement cell which organizes activities like Placement drives, lectures on placement opportunities and entrepreneurship development etc. For the student training and placement, the college has established Conneqt Business Solution Limited center on the campus. The list of details of the campus placement has been attached as additional information.

4. Rotaract club brings together people ages 18 and above to develop leadership and professional skills. Rotaract stands for "Rotary in Action". It focuses on the development of young adults as leaders. Rotaract club works for organising blood donation camps, creating awareness by organising rallies and awareness campaigns regarding drug abuse, AIDS, use of plastic bags, use of China dor, Road safety rules, Tree plantation movements, environmental safety campaigns, celebrating literacy day, Worlds cleanliness day, National voters'day and creating a feelings of empathy by organising visits to old age homes, schools of deaf and dump children, schools of blind children etc.

The college effectively runs national Service scheme (NSS). Every year around 100 NSS volunteers are enrolled under the NSS Unit. Every year NSS unit actively participates in "Joy of Giving Week" and distributes the clothes and eatables to needy people in the nearby areas. NSS volunteers also collect the winter clothes and distribute the winter clothes in slum areas. To develop competence required for group-living and sharing of responsibilities, the NSS unit organizes a 7 days NSS camp and the students are involved in various group activities like Cleanliness Drive, visited the Gurdwara Sahib in Tharike village, Making bird houses, Lecture on Eye Donation, Yoga camp etc. To develop the capacity to meet emergencies and natural disasters the NSS unit organize the Free medical Check-up and Blood Donation Camp, Special One Day Camp to promote the "Swachh Bharat Mission", Food Adulteration Awareness Drive (Under Poshan Maah) and Vigilance Awareness week-2019 and Pledge. To practise national integration and social harmony the NSS unit organize activities on National days like Independence Day celebrations, National Voter's Day, 70th Anniversary of Indian Constitution, Rashtriya Ekta Diwas or National Unity Day and National yoga Day. The NSS unit of college has adopted a village Thakkarwal, Ludhiana. Gtge NSS programme officers along with the volunteers visit the village from time to time to make the villagers aware of personal hygiene.

6.2.2 The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment and service rules, procedures, etc.

The college is permanently affiliated to panjab University, chandigarh and is governed by Gujranwala Khalsa Educational Council. The college is having three-tier systems for its governance. At Management level college is governed by the President, the Secretary and by the other members of the GKEC. Procedures for Recruitment: In the college the recruitment is carried out in two different ways:

.Permanent Posts (Grant-in-aid): These posts are recruited by DPI according to the norms of the University and UGC.

Temporary Posts (Non-Grant): These posts are recruited by the Management according to the norms of the University and UGC.

Procedures for Promotion: The promotion is allotted according to Panjab University, Chandigarh and UGC, New Delhi.

Grievance Redressal Mechanism: The college has Anti Ragging Committee and Disciplinary Committee for timely redressal of the student and the faculty grievances.

Mechanisms for grievance redressal

- a) Student's direct access to authorities – Students can directly approach the Principal, the Viceprincipal, and Head of the Departments to put up their grievances.

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the

quality assurance strategies and processes

Response:

In the pursuance for quality assurance, quality up-gradation, assessment and accreditation, and institutionalization, the college has established the Internal Quality Assurance Cell on Oct. 2014. Since then IQAC has become instrumental in suggesting a number of quality improvement measures in the college.

The two examples of practices institutionalized as a result of IQAC initiatives are given as under:

Augmentation of teaching-learning facilities.

In pursuit of its commitment towards imparting quality education, the IQAC cell of the College framed a comprehensive quality policy aimed at quality enhancement and assurance.

- In pursuance of the quality policy, the College emphasized on adoption of innovative teaching methodologies by the faculty members.
- Recognizing the potential of experiential learning for better understanding and for intellectual and personality development, interactive sessions with experts from industry and the academia along with industrial visits and field trips were organized by various departments of the College.
- The ICT facility was extended to cover all the departments. This provided the impetus for an augmented adoption of ICT in the teaching learning process.
- With the objective of implementing an all inclusive education policy, special initiatives for catering to the diverse learning needs of the slow learners as well as the advanced learners were taken up.

Strengthen Research Culture in the College.

IQAC plays an important role in inculcating research culture in the college. The Research Committee of the College played a proactive role in promotion of research temperament amongst the faculty members. Consequently, there was a substantial increase in the number of research publications as well as in the participation of the faculty in the research oriented activities viz. seminars, conferences etc as compared to the previous years.

Due to the efforts taken by IQAC at present, the college teachers have published 59 research papers in the peer reviewed refereed/UGC approved/SCI/SCOPUS indexed journals, 156 papers published in conferences/workshops/symposiums/books/chapters in various publications and completed 01 minor project during the last five years. The college has organized 34 Seminars/Conferences/ Workshops including online at national /international level and 27 extension lectures in the last five years. Response:

The college reviews its teaching-learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals through IQAC. Following is the example of institutional reviews and implementation of teaching-learning reform facilitated by IQAC

Structured feedback and Review of learning outcomes:

Feedback is part and parcel of the teaching-learning process. The analysis of the effectiveness of teaching learning is made through the stakeholder's feedback mechanism. The collection and analysis of feedback from different stakeholder assist the institution to understand the need of society and what other stakeholders expect from the college. Keeping this view in the consideration, IQAC has developed well-structured feedback systems. IQAC prepares various feedback forms and collects structured feedback on design and review of syllabus and student feedback on teachers. Each department analyzes the feedback, discusses in the departmental meetings and submits a consolidated report to IQAC. Seeking feedback and information from the students helps the College in identifying the areas of improvement. After identification of the weak areas, steps are taken collectively both by the management as well as the principal to provide best of the facilities and fill in the gaps.

From the academic year, 2019-20 the college has developed an online feedback system. Student learning outcomes are reviewed through class tests, assignments, class seminars, field projects, open book tests, internal assessment.

The college has secured 'B' grade with 2.63 CGPA in the 1st cycle of NAAC accreditation in 2015, since then the college has endeavored incremental improvements in quality initiatives. Following are the significant quality initiatives during the post-accreditation:

- Establishing a Wi-Fi campus with 100MBPS lease line and Firewall installed
- Participation in AISHE.
- Subscription of INFLIBNET and DELNET. The N-List facility was extended to provide seamless, reliable and ubiquitous access to scholarly, peer reviewed electronic resources.
- Implementation of e-governance in Administration, Finance, Examination etc.
- Introduction of UGC sponsored 03 courses in community college and 04 B.VOC courses. Got

approval of 09 skill based courses from UGC in 2020.

- Organization of summer workshops to enhance the skill set of the non teaching staff and hence improve their employability quotient
- Outline standard quality benchmarks for enhancement of academic quality.
- Facilitate the up gradation of teaching and research proficiency of the faculty.
- Co-ordinate the organization of various academic, sports and other extracurricular activities for all round development of the students.
- Initiated community oriented services and programmes as part of Institution Social Responsibility.
- The college and University of Wolverhampton, Wolverhampton (England), entered an agreement for bringing out more opportunities for faculty members and students of both organisations, and to pursue research projects, seminars, faculty and students exchange programmes and to explore the career opportunities for Indian students in England.
- The Memorandum of Understanding is signed by Pravasi Sahit Adhyan Kender running under P. G. Dept. of Punjabi of our college and Punjab Bhawan (Surry) Canada. This MoU would facilitate the Punjabi writers, scholars and academicians of India and Canada to interact with each other and to understand the current trends of Pravasi Punjabi literature. The college also signed 06 MOUs with national level organisations.
- Preparation of AQAR as per the guidelines and parameters set by NAAC.
- A number of skill development workshops were organized by various departments during the summer vacation.
- In a major qualitative reform, the College is gearing up towards implementing the Choice based Credit System (CBCS) from the session 2018-19 as per Panjab University guidelines.
- The ICT facility in the College was further extended with procurement of new computers. Four new smart class rooms were created. Two additional projectors were also procured.
- The labs were upgraded with procurement of new equipments.
- The infrastructural facilities were further enhanced.
- Upgradation of the college website and developed online feedback and admission system
- Installation of 70KW solar power system.
- Under the Green Initiative Programme of the college, effective measures were undertaken for waste segregation, waste management and water harvesting and E-waste collection.

Response:

The college's key activities have very less impact on the environment as the college is very responsive of generating less waste and recycling it by passing it through the scientific ways that enable the used material to be recycled ensuring that less natural resources are used. Waste generated on the campus is segregated as a solid waste, liquid waste, and e-waste.

Solid Waste Management:

1. The college generally has green waste in the form of grass and leaves, fruits and vegetable waste (peels etc.) from college canteen which is thrown in separate pits and used for **Vermi-composting**.
2. Solid waste is segregated as biodegradable and non-biodegradable. Separate dustbins are used for collecting the biodegradable and non-biodegradable waste across the whole campus.
3. Non-biodegradable wastes like plastic bottles are used to turn into beautiful flower pots by Nek Chand Memorial Club of college. The plastic waste which cannot be transformed sent for recycling through junk dealer.
4. The college has solid waste disposal bins in each block which is collected by concerned employees daily for its disposal.
5. Use of pesticides and harmful chemical fertilizers is replaced by organic manure produced by green waste.
6. Polythene bags usage is discouraged.

7. College has also two paper crusher machines to dispose waste paper.

Liquid waste management

1. Organic liquid waste generated from canteen etc. is discharged into sewage system.
2. Chemical waste disposal is a major issue. This project is in the initial stage. It is planned to collect liquid waste in pits outside the laboratories and do necessary actions to make the liquid less toxic.

E-Waste Management: E-waste is much more hazardous than other waste because electronic components contain cadmium, lead, mercury, and Polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs) that can damage human health and the environment. E-waste generated in the campus is very less in quantity. The cartridges of laser printers are refilled outside the college campus. Administration conducts the awareness programmes regarding E-waste Management with the help of various departments. The E-waste and defective item from computer laboratory is being stored properly. The institution has decided to contact approved E-waste management and disposal facility in order to dispose E-waste in scientific manner.

Recommendations: Recycle or safely dispose of white goods, computers and electrical appliances. Use reusable resources and containers and avoid unnecessary packaging where possible. Always purchase recycled resources where these are both suitable and available.

13. Prof Manpreet Kaur, Prof Asha Rani, Prof Balkar, and Prof Jagkiran are provided full support for pursuing their Ph.D.
14. The solar power plant installed in the institution saves around 7 lakh rupees per year.
15. Micro irrigation system uses 30-50% less water.
16. Vermi-composting unit helped us to convert solid waste into organic fertilizers.
17. Through air quality tester quality of air has been tested inside and outside the campus and it has been observed that quality of air inside the campus is much better than outside.

Title of the Practice – Using Non-Conventional Energy Source (Solar Energy)

We do our BEST for the BEST of our Environment

Gujranwala Guru Nanak Khalsa College, Ludhiana believes in Green and Clean practices. The strength of students and employees in our college is around 2000. The solar power plant is a leading and distinct infrastructure development program of the centenary celebrations of our college. Our college is pioneer to use solar energy as the source of energy among all the colleges in the city. Minister of Food, Civil supplies,

and consumer affair of Punjab, Bharat Bhushan Ashu inaugurated the solar power plant on 22nd December 2018. The capacity of this solar power plant is 70 kilowatt power which costed around 28 lakhs. This project includes 223 solar panels of 315 watt capacity each.

There is no compromise with the quality of its major and minor equipments such as panels belong to Vikram brand and the inverter is of Delta Company. This solar power plant produces approximately 160 units of electricity per day in the winter season which almost doubles in the summer season. In a simple mathematical calculation, if 10 rupees per unit of electricity cost is considered, then it saves the electricity of rupees 1600 daily and rupees 40,000 approximately per month in this winter season, which will be double in the summer season. In a nutshell, it saves around rupees 7 lakhs per year.

In addition to this, the college has total of 39 air conditioners, 6 Ovens, 4 water coolers, 5 water dispensers, 2 deep freezers, 8 room heaters, 10 electrical kettles, 4 RO (water purifiers), 2 water filters and 7 refrigerators. All of these electrical appliances results in a very high electricity consumption every year, around 1,11, 606 KWH. But the installation of solar power plant has reduced the electricity bills by about 60%.

The **Feed in Tariff** (FiT) is a Government-backed scheme offered by electricity supplier and, if in future we opt for it, we could get paid for the energy generated by our solar PV system. The biggest utility or advantage of this solar project is its durability and sustained efficiency which will remain unaffected for next 25 years. This whole project has been handled and completed within the given time limits by Mittal Machines private limited.

Achievements:

- **Independence**

Investing in a solar power system has made our college less reliant on the National Grid for electricity.

- **Saved money**

Our electricity bills have decreased quite a bit because of the power we are generating and using, and buying very less from our supplier.

- **Low maintenance**

Solar panels require very little maintenance. They are installed at an angle which allows rain to run off freely, washing dirt and dust away.
